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PEACE CLUBS in Schools

Peace Club activity, at a national level, declined drastically during 2015. Several reasons contributed to this, mainly:

- I. Umtapo did not have any funding for Peace Club activity
- II. Mr Mbete who headed the Safer Schools Project in the Eastern Cape Department of Education had departed and there was no follow-up to his work with Umtapo and the Peace Clubs in EC
- III. Educators were becoming less committed to the programme because of heavy workloads and DOE pressure (or political pressure)
- IV. Attempts by Umtapo to engage the DOE in the different provinces received no response

Nevertheless, Umtapo continued with monitoring of the Peace Clubs that existed and engaged them in activity such as the inter-school debates on corruption and short workshops on PHARE and leadership development (summary below). The growth of Peace Clubs, however, in the Peddie area, is reported separately under the SeVISSA programme.

Launch of the Children's Peace Movement (CPM)



In a unique programme initiated at the beginning of 2011, UMTAPO in partnership with the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund (NMCF), developed in theory and praxis, a *Model for Child Participation* that led to the launch of a grassroots **Children's Peace Movement** on 2nd May 2015 in Durban. The critical focus of the movement will be *Breaking the Silence against Child Abuse and Promoting Ubuntu*.

The launch was preceded by a national evaluation on 1st May 2015. An evaluation was conducted by the children who have been involved in the process and who were members of the Children's Peace & Empowerment Forums (CPEFs) in primary schools and Peace Clubs in secondary schools. This has been a process of building children's leadership and child participation in decision-making that spanned more than 4 years, focusing on disadvantaged communities.

The launch of the Children's Peace Movement and gala dinner was held at the Pavilion Hotel on Durban's Marine Parade on 2nd May 2015. In keeping with its promotion of Child Participation, the

National Evaluation

The national evaluation brought together 80 children and educator and stakeholder representatives from three provinces involved in the project: Limpopo, Eastern Cape, and Kwazulu Natal. The representatives were elected at provincial evaluations held in November 2014.

The whole process highlighted to children, who were a part of it, what democracy should be like as they went about planning, discussing, and

making decisions for themselves. Below are the decisions they made during group discussions about the way forward:

Child Abuse: Physical, emotional and sexual

- Form discussion groups that will talk about the types of abuse, involve relevant stakeholders like social workers, police, parents and community as a whole
- Encourage both the victim and the perpetrators to be part of the CPM and organise relevant stakeholders so that they can get counselling if needed.
- Spread the word on social networks as well

Bullying in schools

- Start a no bullying campaign
- Can also make posters and send the message through songs and poems
- Report bullying to the teachers and expose bullies so they can be afraid of doing the same thing to the next person
- Invite the bullies to the CPM so that they can change their behaviour towards other people

Peacelessness in the community

- Make peace campaigns in schools and involve relevant stakeholders
- Form part of the existing community structures to make sure the children voices are heard in all walks of the community
- Do picketing campaigns wearing the CPM t-shirts while fighting the causes of peacelessness in our society





Towards the Children's Movement in South Africa

Children, during the dialogues, articulated the following reasons for a children's movement:

- To encourage children to speak-out and fight injustices.
- To educate and empower children for mass mobilization.
- To work with the media to expose violence aimed at children.
- To engage children in the democratic processes and provide them with relevant information.
- To instill the values and principles of Ubuntu, self-reliance, peace, love, etc.
- To defend and promote children's needs in society.
- To create a conducive environment to build leaders who will develop authentic responses to issues of children.
- To allow children space to be creative and innovative in dealing with their issues.
- To create space for an uprising that is led by children themselves.
- To identify campaigns with specific themes.
- To set clear goals and gather energy to realize it.
- To create space for networking within and amongst the children and other stakeholders.

Nelson Mandela Children's Fund visited St Lawrence Children's Peace Movement in KwaNyuswa on **27**th **August 2015**.

They organised a debate on "Should cellphones be allowed in school?"

- All Members of the CPM were all present and were very active during the debate.
- The CPM has a great impact on the school as educators use their work for classroom lessons.

The **Kwa-Manzini Primary School Children's Peace Movement** in Kwazulu Natal organised a soccer tournament in the local sports ground in Kwa-Ndengezi. Community members, parents and the South African Police Service were invited and participated in the event. The members of Children's Peace Movement were actively involved in the planning of the event using self-reliance. The learners had attended the leadership camp in 2014 and the theme "Breaking the Silence Against Child Abuse" inspired them to organise the event using the same theme as they felt that parents and the community must be informed about the rights of children and that as adults they must protect and love children.

The **St Lawrence Primary Children's Peace Movement** in Kwazulu Natal has made such a great impact at the school not only with the learners but also with the educators. The presentations and posters done by the Children's Peace Movement are used by the educators to facilitate teaching focusing on Child Abuse and rights of the child.

Sexual Violence in Schools in South Africa (SeViSSA)

The Nelson Mandela Children's Fund has partnered with Comic Relief and local organisations to coordinate a programme addressing Sexual Violence against Girls in Schools in South Africa (SeVissa). The project will be executed over a period of five years.

Nelson Mandela CHILDREN'S FUND

Comic Relief is a major charity based in the UK and one of the largest non-governmental funders of development work in sub Saharan Africa.

The intention of the programme is to mitigate the impact of violence, bullying, abuse and exploitation of learners in schools and communities with a special focus on the effects these have on girls' education and their ability to reach their optimal potential in life.

The programme will be implemented in four provinces:

- Eastern Cape (site Peddie)
- Western Cape
- Limpopo
- Gauteng

Each province has a consortium made up of a lead organisation and partner organisation. The lead organisation will administer the funds for the consortium and be accountable for reporting to the donors. In the Eastern Cape, UMTAPO is the lead organisation and in Limpopo, UMTAPO is a partner organisation.

In the Eastern Cape, the project is focused on 16 villages around Peddie which fall under the Ngqushwa Local Municipality and Amathole District Municipality.

DEMOCRACY, HUMAN RIGHTS & ANTI-CORRUPTION

Strengthening Civil Society towards an Ethical Nation

This project aims to play a role in bridging that gap between the availability of various role-players including Chapter 9 institutions that deal with human rights and anti-corruption issues and the involvement of an active citizenry. UMTAPO believes that the culture of greed and corruption that has set in has impacted negatively on post-apartheid transformation especially in relation to delivering to the most disadvantaged. It has also impacted on UMTAPO's work in peace and human rights education and therefore the need for greater civil society involvement in such a project.

The project involves training of students at tertiary institutions, organizing inter-school debates, convening community workshops, hosting a national symposium, and setting up an advice desk.

In 2015, three training courses took place: in Limpopo, Gauteng, and Eastern Cape (details in table below).

Other activities included the establishment of Anti-Corruption Forums in communities in Limpopo, the design and printing of 200 t-shirts; and the establishment of a collaboration with Corruption Watch, an NGO that has been active in the field of anti-corruption and which is the SA chapter of Transparency International.



Some responses from Gauteng students on the course were:

Thank you so very much for the opportunity. This has been one of the best and most enlightening experiences of my life. Keep up the good work in making our country (and world) a better place.

I am equipped enough now to question this comfort that people have with turning a blind eye to injustice. I am a proud whistle blower.

The information was so important and clear because most of the time we are ignorant about corruption and ubuntu. As people we can work together to make things happen

....the facilitators were not only concerned about the objectives they wanted to achieve but also our moral character as individuals was very paramount to them.

Umtapo is really making us proud and we are inspired to continue the good work that it does – giving back to the community.

The deviations from what was planned were driven out of the practical realities of university and school commitments, in particular. Being a unique programme in the country, the start was slow and tedious because young people and communities had to understand and get to grips with its importance and ramifications. This also necessitated a workshop at the beginning of the year with the task team of students who were elected in 2014 to represent each province involved. It was agreed at this workshop that the initial focus would be on mobilising students at the universities and the inter-school debates would follow leaving the community workshops for the latter part of the project. Organising the inter-school debates has been made all the more difficult because schools are reluctant to use official school-time for these activities and learners are not very willing to use out-of-school time.

Of greater consequence was the unpredicted Fees Must Fall protest action which resulted in a flurry of last minute changes.

The training course planned for the Western Cape in October 2015 had to be postponed to 2016 and a hastily planned training course for the Eastern Cape was instituted to ensure that all courses could be completed within the projected time-frame. These changes required much consultation with the students during a fluid and volatile period.

The third deviation has been the postponement of the symposium from December 2015 to March 2016. This was done due to the shifting of the training courses as mentioned above.

While the unforeseen student uprising during this period resulted in deviations from the original plan, it is not expected to significantly affect the implementation of the project because UMTAPO has already re-scheduled and reorganised itself to ensure that outstanding activities will be completed within the time-frame.

Ironically, the student uprising, while delaying processes, has heightened student awareness and interest in participation in the project. The Eastern Cape Training, under the circumstances, was a success. And enrolment for the KZN and Western Cape trainings for 2016 has already reached its targeted figures.



The official launch of the co-operative was successfully held on the 21st of October 2015 and according to the organisers, "this was all through the efforts and sacrifices put on by the members of the cooperative who decided to carry on with the launch after support was cancelled by the Department of Social Developmen. Members of the co-op went all out to look for donations and support to make the event a success. A cow was slaughtered and women from the community were asked to do the cooking and catering for the guests".

The Department of Social Development, however, helped with transport and a donation of 350 cans of cold drinks and the Amatola Water Supply Company donated bottles of water.

The official ribbon was cut by the board member of Umtapo, Mrs Ntsiki Biko. Mr. Z Braweni and Mr. K Yekani conducted the formal tour of the garden and the greenhouse for guests.


Messages of support were read out by the DSD, Buffalo City Municipality, UMTAPO, SCAT, and the Department of Agriculture. The launch concluded with the vote of thanks by Mr Braweni.

Unfortunately, the end of 2015 brought many setbacks for the Entlango Cooperative because of a blockage of the engine pump that supplies water to the reservoir, the greenhouse and the vegetable garden and that affected electricity as well which was off for the whole month of December/January. The tomatoes, cabbages, beetroot and spinach were severely damaged as a result.

This disaster, say the co-operative, "brought many challenges including losing potential customers. Another issue of concern was the lack of rainfall. Again valued customers were lost. The Departments of Agriculture and Social Development came in to assist with new seedlings, fertilizers and repairing of the electricity.

Nthabalala Co-operative

The **Nthabalala Co-operative**, another initiative which has its roots with Umtapo's Peace Afrika Youth Forums, was the site of visits by one of Umtapo's donors, the CS Mott Foundation, and students from universities in Gauteng. Having started out with a small poultry project, it now produces more than 1 500 chicken at a time, it has begun vegetable production, and is currently the site of a bio-gas research project.






STRINI MOODLEY MEMORIAL LECTURE 2015

STRINI MOODLEY ANNUAL MEMORIAL LECTURE

Professor Salim Vally delivered the 8th Annual Strini Moodley Memorial Lecture at the University of KwaZulu-Natal. Vally's lecture, themed "The Battle for Truth: Youth, Neo-liberalism and Education in South Africa", coinciding with Africa Month.



Salim Vally is the director of the Centre for Education Rights and Transformation and an associate professor at the Faculty of Education, University of Johannesburg and a visiting professor at the Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University.

He holds a PhD from UKZN, studied at York and Wits and has been a visiting lecturer at Columbia, Virginia, Fort Hare and York universities. He continues to publish extensively while agreeing with Howard Zinn that "most academics publish while others perish" and therefore continues with his abiding interest in linking academic scholarship with societal concerns, community participation and global solidarity.

Vally was a leading member of the South African Students

Movement in 1976/1977 and left the country after its banning by the erstwhile apartheid regime. He returned to South Africa in 1982, taught at secondary schools and worked for progressive literacy organisations. From 1985 to 1994 he was the education officer for CCAWUSA (later SACCAWU), a founding member of COSATU and was a staff member of the University of the Witwatersrand from 1995 to 2009.

On behalf of the University of Kwazulu Natal, Dr Lubna Nadvi, an academic whose areas of specialisation includes Political Science, said Strini Moodley cut his political teeth on Salisbury Island, the predecessor to the University of Durban-Westville. UDW merged with the University of Natal in 2004, to form the University of KwaZulu-Natal.

The **2015 Umtapo Strini Moodley Peace Activist Award**, presented by Ms Asha Moodley to Ms Nombeko Ndlovu of Langa High School in Cape Town.

Ms Ndlovu was trained by UMTAPO as a peace activist more than a decade ago and in spite of being promoted to Deputy Principal at her school, she was thoroughly committed to the UMTAPO programme and the Peace Club at her school



Steve Biko Seminar

Education for Liberation: Myth or is there a possibility of realization of this dream?

The Steve Biko Seminar was held on 18th September 2015 at the Durban University of Technology (DUT). Keynote speaker was Enver Motala and respondents: Ms Asha Moodley (UMTAPO) and Prof Thengani Ngwenya (DUT).

Enver Motala, educationist, trade unionist, social activist, is adjunct professor at the Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University and researcher at the Nelson Mandela Institute for Education and Rural Development at the University of Fort Hare

His input was based on 4 issues:

- 1. The critical contribution of Black Consciousness (BC)
- 2. Education and what it stands for noting that it is a critical catalyst for the nature of the society that we want
- 3. Beyond complaining
- 4. What is conceptually and practically possible



Enver reminded participants that history was being re-written. People were being subjected to a new history as perceived only by those who considered themselves the heirs to the struggle for liberation. He urged young scholars to study history and write it in the "fullness of all its attributes".

GENERAL

UMTAPO STAFF & BOARD CHANGES

Four national staff workshops took place during the year: February, May, September and December. These workshops play an important role in the critical reflection process. It not only deals with the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats (SWOT) posed to the organization, it also addresses individual staff concerns – re-energizing staff when energy levels are low and when societal issues seem to be overwhelming.

The result of the above workshops has been a strengthening of the resolve and commitment of the staff to continue with the work that UMTAPO was doing and to maintain the vision and direction of the organization.

The recent youth employment at the national and branch levels have proved to be very valuable. The tertiary student co-ordinator at the national office in Durban, the full-time field worker in the Eastern Cape, and the two volunteer field workers in Limpopo reflect Umtapo's commitment to building youth leadership.

The branch office in Limpopo has developed the capacity to function almost independently. While the branch director is accountable to the national office, she raises funds independently for the local office and has youth volunteer field workers — they have been out of school youth who were trained by Untapo in its PHARE programme. The office has become an advice centre for the community dealing with issues ranging from labour to education.

There was one significant change to the Board in 2015. Kutelani Sigidi, a product of Umtapo's youth leadership training and PHARE programme, joined the Board. Kutelani is from Makhado, Limpopo and works for the Department of Health.



Obituary Oshadi Mangena (June 12, 1931 – September 24, 2015)

Dr Oshadi Mangena, patron of Umtapo and the chief facilitator of the Women and Development Course that was hosted by Umtapo in nine provinces over seven years, passed away on 24th September 2015.

In the late 1960s and early 1970s, Oshadi was the executive director of the Association for the Education and Cultural Advancement of South Africa. She was concurrently elected as president of the Transvaal region of the world-affiliated Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA). From 1974 until it was banned in 1977, she was the national president of the YWCA of South Africa.

She became a member of the Christian Institute of Southern Africa (CI) in 1968 and left her career as a nurse in 1973 to become a staff member of the institute, to which she was elected regional director in 1976. In the early 1970s she joined the Black People's Convention, the political wing of the Black Consciousness Movement and collaborated actively with the Pretoria branch of the South African Student's Association (SASO).

In 1976, Oshadi was detained after the June 1976 uprising, and spent months at the Old Fort prison, now Constitution Hill and was eventually banned and restricted to Mamelodi Township in Pretoria. In April 1977 she was forced into exile first to Botswana and then to The Netherlands.

She was appointed the European representative for the Christian Institute, a position she held until 1980 when the institute closed down. She also worked closely with the Black Consciousness Movement in exile.

Whilst in exile, she completed her BA degree in political science and public administration at the University of South Africa. In addition she obtained a master's degree in development studies from the Institute of Social Studies in The Hague (Netherlands), and her PhD in social sciences from the University of Amsterdam. She lectured in development studies at the University of Amsterdam from 1984 to 1996.
